# "Our Town" A Word from Supervisor

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Dr. Calvin Schierer and Mrs. Marcy Culbert for the medical attention given to Town of Hume Dog Control Officer Joan Wagner.

The Main Street grant the Town of Hume applied for was denied. We will apply again at a later date.

The Preliminary 2011 Budget public hearing was October 26, there were no attendees. After general discussion the 2011 budget was adopted by the Town of Hume Town Board.

## Town of Hume Water/Sewer

The Town of Hume Water and Sewer plant are an valuable asset for the town. Water/Sewer Supervisor Dana Potter has his hands full keeping these two departments running smoothly and efficiently.

The Town of Hume Sewer Department services 250 households and businesses. The water department services 320 house-

holds and businesses. The sewer plant is a recalculating stone filter system, which requires much manual labor to operate correctly and efficiently.

Daily maintenance and record keeping for both departments are necessary to ensure proper water quality levels and function of the sewer and water plants. Maintenance checks are preformed daily, seven days a week.

The water and sewer supplied to the taxpayers in the water/sewer district are an asset to homeowners in the event of property sales.



# Frequently Asked Questions

- Q: Is there a leash law in the Town of Hume?
- A: Yes. All dogs must be on a leash or properly confined to their property. Also, any dog over 4 months of age must be licensed.
- Q: Can I burn my trash?
- A: No. New York State passed a No Open Burning law in October of 2009. It <u>superseded</u> an earlier Town law that allowed burning in certain circumstances.
- Q: Is there a noise ordinance?
- A: No.
- Q: Why can't I find the Town of Hume phone number in the book?
- A: The numbers are there, but listed as Hume, Town of.
- Q: Where do I register to vote?
- A: You may register at the Board of Elections office, 6 Schuyler Street, in Belmont.
- Q: How do I obtain a copy of my marriage license?
- A: Contact the Clerk's office where you purchased your license, not the municipality where you were married. If you purchased your license in the Town of Hume, phone 585-567-2666 for more information on how to correctly apply for a copy.
- Q: How do I get a tag for the transfer station?
- A: Apply to the Allegany County DPW at 7 Court Street, Room 210, Belmont, NY 14813, or pick up an application at the Town Clerk's Office.
- Q: When is Town of Hume Court in session?
- A: Town of Hume Justice Court

- convenes on Thursday evenings at 7:00 PM except for the second Thursday of each month when they convene at 5:00 PM. You may call 585-567-2666 to verify that Court is scheduled for a particular Thursday.
- Q: How do I arrange for the Judge to perform my marriage ceremony?
- A: Contact the Justice during Court hours at 585-567-2666 to make your arrangements.
- Q: How can we reserve the Park Pavilion?
- A: Call the Town Clerk's office at 585-567-2666 to verify an open date, then make application and pay the fees. Rental is \$50.00 plus a \$50.00 key deposit that is refundable if, after your event, the key is returned and the pavilion inspection is positive.
- Q: How many people will the Pavilion accommodate?
- A: There are tables and chairs for 50 persons.
- Q: Do you have copies of tax maps?
- A: Yes. You may view them during regular business hours.
- Q: I want to see the assessment rolls. Where are they located?
- A: The tentative and the final tax assessment rolls are at the Town Clerk's office. For detailed assessment information, you may call Russell Heslin, the Assessor, at 585-437-2206.
- Q: Are there any apartments or houses for rent in Fillmore?
- A: I'm sorry, but we do not keep records of that type.

- Q: How do I apply for a job at the Town of Hume?
- A: You may fill out an application available at the Town Clerk's office. At this time, there are no openings, but your application will be kept on file for any time period you request.
- Q: How do I reach the State Police office?
- A: Phone 585-567-2283. That is the Fillmore satellite office. If no one is in the office, your call will ring through to the dispatcher at the Amity station.
- Q: What are your office hours?
- A: Monday through Friday from 9 AM Noon, and 1:00 PM to 5:00 PM.
- Q: Can you notarize something for me?
- A: Town Clerk Sondra MacEwan is a notary and can perform this service for you.
- Q: Does the Town of Hume offer garbage pickup?
- A: No. There is no municipal garbage service. Private companies do area pickup. You have the option of hiring a service or obtaining a transfer station tag for disposal. Once a year, the Town has a White Goods Clean Up Day when appliances and large articles may be left at the Town Highway Sheds.

## A Glance Back...

The following was printed in June 17, 1892 *The Hume Enterprise*:

The height of the human body is generally ten times the length of the face; the face is as long as the hand; the arm is four times the length of the face; the sole is one-sixth the length of the body, and six times the thickness of the hand equals the thickness of the body.

From June 16, 1899 The Hume Enterprise:

In 1898 the State of New York produced 6,638,455 barrels of salt, the total production in the United States that year being 17, 459,291 barrels. The product in the United States is nearly equal to the demand. Only about 7 per cent, of the amount consumed last year was imported. Nearly everybody will now admit that it is better to produce or mine our own salt than to

pay foreign countries for it. Many years will pass before the tariff reformer will attempt again to put salt on the free list.

Also from June 16, 1899 The Hume Enterprise:

The Doud Hardware has some new silk fishing lines that are tested and guaranteed to hold a weight of twenty—three pounds.

The Ricker Hose Dramatic Co. are to present "The Girl From Klondike" on the evenings of the 22nd and 24th inst.

From April 16,1885 Fillmore Enterprise:

Centerville...The largest elm tree is this section stands on M.D. Haok's land. It measures 22 feet in circumference, five feet about the ground.

From the December 2, 1887 The

Fillmore Enterprise: It is asserted that it is not an unusual thing for women who frequently go back and forth between Canada and the United States, along the border of the Ontario peninsula, to wear a smuggling bag. The contrivance is suspended from the waist, reaches within a few inches of the hem of the skirt, and will hold almost as much as a furniture van.

Berry Bros. Entertainment.— The well known and famous Berry Brothers, showmen, are to appear to Hume, Saturday evening next. Their entertainment now consists of Bell Ringing and a comic variety show, spoken of by the press as superb, and most highly entertaining. They give a portion of their receipts for the benefit of the Hume Fire Department. Admission 25 cts, children 15 cts.
